

president introduced a teenage cancer survivor, a young mad selected to attend West Point, and family members of people who tragically lost their lives.

Democrats in the audience even were heard chanting and booing as Trump started his address. The only one who did not get sore hands was Texas Congressman Al Green, who was so disruptively disrespectful to the President during the beginning of his remarks, that **House Speaker Mike Johnson** directed the Sergeant at Arms to escort him out of the chamber. In no way are today's Democrats anything like "Your Father's Democrat Party."

Trump said that six weeks ago, "I stood beneath the dome of this Capitol and proclaimed the dawn of the Golden Age of America. From that moment on, it has been nothing but swift and unrelenting action to usher in the greatest and most successful era in the history of the country."

He added, "Over the past six weeks, I have signed nearly 100 executive orders and taken more than 400 executive actions to restore common sense, safety, optimism, and wealth across our wonderful land. The people elected me to do the job, and I am doing it. In fact, it has been stated by many that the first month of our presidency is the most successful in the history of our nation".

Continuing, Trump said, "We have accomplished more in 43 days than most administrations accomplish in four years or eight years, and we are just getting started. I return to this chamber tonight to report that America's momentum is back. Our spirit is back. Our pride is back. Our confidence is back. And the American dream is surging – bigger and better than ever before."

During his remarks, Trump called out former President Joe Biden multiple times, which was an unusual and rare move for a sitting president to do. He called Biden "the worst president in American history," while explaining that illegal migrant crossing at the southern border are down during his presidency compared to that of his predecessor. And lamenting that his administration inherited "an economic nightmare" from the Biden administration, Trump said he is fighting "to reverse this damage."

One of the biggest applause points in the speech occurred when Trump urged Congress to pass a mandatory death penalty for anyone who kills a police officer.

Other highlights of his speech were his promise for across-the-board tax cuts, including personal income, corporate and industry cuts; that his trade policies will remain centered around tariffs designed to boost foreign investment and balance trade deficits; praise for the work of **Elon Musk** and the Department of Government Efficiency; creation of a White House Office of Shipbuilding to counter China's strides in the shipbuilding sector; and his surprise announcement that the terrorist responsible for killing 13 U.S. service members during the 2021 withdrawal from Afghanistan has been captured and is now in custody.

Trump introduced a number of guests he had in the audience, including **D.J. Daniel**, a 13-year-old cancer patient whose dream is to become a police officer, and who was thrilled when the president surprised him by having **Secret Service Director Sean Curran** present him with a real badge making him a Secret Service Agent.

Another young attendee in the audience, **Jason Harley**, had applied to attend the West Point Military Academy, and joyfully learned from the President that his application has been approved.

Marc Fogel, a teacher whom Trump helped free from a Russian prison attended the speech along with his elderly mother, as well as family members of Laken Riley and Jocelyn Nungaray, who were killed by illegal aliens in the U.S., and of Corey Comperatore, who was killed at the rally in Virginia where Trump was shot.

When all of these special guests were applauded by Republican legislators, the Democrats in the gallery remained silent.

At one point in his remarks, Trump said, "I could find a cure to the most devastating disease, a disease that would wipe out an entire nation, or announce the answer to the greatest economy in history or the stoppage of crime to the lowest level ever recorded, and these people will not clap, will not stand up, and certainly will not cheer. Five times I've been up here. It's very sad, and it just shouldn't be that way."

And there was one Trump comment that was considered his best quote of the evening: "The media and our friends in the Democrat party kept saying we needed new legislation; we must have legislation to secure the border. But it turned out that all we really needed ... was a new president."

After his speech, CBS News, which is no great fan of the President, conducted a poll and reported that 76 percent of watchers indicated a favorable response to his message and presentation.

DESANTIS OPENS FLORIDA LEGISLATIVE SESSION



Florida Governor Ron DeSantis, in a 30-minute State of the State address to the opening session of the 2025 Florida State Legislature on March 4, called for lower property taxes, business tax cuts, budget cuts, rolling back restrictions on firearms, and new

restrictions on petitions for constitutional amendments.

Speaking of State Senate President Ben Albritton and House Speaker Daniel Perez, the Governor said that "Working together, we have amassed a record that is without peer anywhere else in the entire country."

Praising Florida for maintaining a strong economy, DeSantis said the state had a lower-than-average unemployment rate for 50 consecutive months. He also mentioned that Florida welcomed 142 million tourists in 2024, and that insurance reforms have helped reduce rates, with the most prominent companies reporting 6-10% decreases.

"Our economy is strong because of sensible spending," DeSantis said, "Florida has the lowest state debt in America after paying off 41% of its debt over the last 6 years." He also emphasized the state's commitment to low taxes and providing billions in tax relief.

In education, the Governor highlighted Florida's status as the top state for school choice, and the first to enact such a program. He introduced a Teachers' Bill of Rights and announced increased funding for teacher salaries and civics programs.

"Florida leads. We lead with purpose and conviction, determination and strength, faith, and hope.," he said. "Florida is the leader among the states because we lean into challenges, tackle the big issues, and deliver results for the people we serve." DeSantis added that "our rights come from God, not government." He added, "We chose freedom over fear; education over indoctrination; law and order over rioting and disorder."

Thanks to the recent legislation, DeSantis said, "It is now a crime to enter Florida illegally, the days of catch and release are over, and all state and local law enforcement have a duty to assist in interior immigration enforcement efforts. The voters have spoken — and Florida has responded — we will be part of the solution, not part of the problem."

The Governor said, "Our economy is strong in part because our spending and budget policies are sensible. We are actually spending less money in the current fiscal year than we did in the previous year.

Where else have they actually reduced spending? We have the lowest number of state government workers per capita in the country. Over the past six years, we have more than tripled our state's rainy day fund. Florida just celebrated its 180th birthday and I'm happy to say that just since 2019, we have paid off 41%

of the debt accumulated over those 180 years. Our state has among the lowest per capita state debt in America."

Florida has also led on education, DeSantis noted, "and has been ranked #1 in America for the past two years. We are the top state in America for school choice. This has changed lives. Our universal school choice program works -- families and students have benefitted, and the academic bar has been raised throughout the state."

Regarding universities, DeSantis said, "We led the way in being the first state to eliminate DEI from our higher education system. We continue to lead by holding the line on tuition. We have not allowed a tuition increase since I've been governor and Florida has the lowest in-state tuition in America. Florida families deserve state universities that provide education, not indoctrination."

Explaining that "We need to be a strong Second Amendment state," DeSantis said. "Let's get some positive reform done for the people of Florida."

Other accomplishments achieved over the past six years, he said, included banning China from purchasing land in Florida, enactment of a digital Bill of Rights, protection against central bank digital currency, institution of the death penalty for pedophiles, repayment of state debt, protection for the sanctity of life, law enforcement bonus and scholarship programs, accountability to pharma companies to lower drug costs, and a Moving Florida Forward program to accelerate infrastructure and congestion relief projects.

The Governor said he looked forward to work together with the legislature's presiding officers to advance shared goals. While coming from differing backgrounds, he said these leaders "have a strong desire to make Florida a better place. Congratulations on earning this opportunity to lead your respective chambers."

POLITICAL JOTTINGS AND DOTTINGS



While the U.S. Senate continues to confirm multiple Trump nominees to government leadership positions, two of the nominees failed the effort. Ironically, both of them were former U.S. Representatives in Congress from Florida.

First, former Congressman Matt Gaetz dropped his opportunity to become Secretary of State, and then, former U.S. Congressman Dr. Dave Weldon was told his nomination to head the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention was being cancelled just hours before he was scheduled to be interviewed by a Senate panel for the position.

Weldon's statement after the surprising decision was: "My big sin was that as a Congressman 25 years ago, I had the temerity to take on the CDC and Big Pharma on two critical childhood vaccine safety issues. Hundreds of parents had been coming to me from all over the country, insisting that their child has been seriously damaged by the inoculations."

That was enough for "Big Pharma" to convince enough Senators to oppose his nomination. But still supportive of Trump, Weldon added, "The president is a busy man doing good work for our nation, and the last thing he needs is a controversy about CDC."

In a bombshell report, the Freedom Herald website reported controversy surrounding the autopen used for four years during the Biden Administration on executive decisions, noting that the cognitively challenged president rarely signed his own documents, relying instead on unelected bureaucrats wielding an autopen while the real power players ran America into the ground. Therefore, every executive order under Biden — including the last minute pardons issued—could be declared null and void.

According to the Heritage Foundation Oversight Project, Biden rarely if ever signed his own documents, instead relying on the bureaucrats with an autopen to authorize everything from executive orders to international agreements. This isn't just incompetence – it's potentially one of the greatest constitutional crises in American history. The autopen – a mechanical device that reproduces signatures – was apparently used extensively throughout Biden's term, raising serious questions about who was actually making decisions affecting over 330 million Americans.

Too late for last month's issue, **President Donald Trump** held the first Cabinet meeting of his second administration at the White House on February 26, discussing a wide range of topics, including government-shrinking efforts, the Ukraine rare earths deal, and Taiwan.

Despite a recent decline in border crossings, Trump said he would continue with his plans to impose tariffs on Canada and Mexico, noting that "Millions of people have died because of the fentanyl that comes over the border."

Having recently proposed "Gold Card" visas to wealthy immigrants in exchange for a \$5 million investment in the United States, the President said, "I don't know, maybe it will sell like crazy."

DOGE leader Elon Musk, who attended the Cabinet meeting said that the email sent to federal employees from the Office of Personnel Management asking for a bullet-point list of five work accomplishments from the past week had been misinterpreted as a "performance review," but it's a "pulse review". Adding, "Do you have a pulse, and can you reply to this email?"

Several days after Trump said he wanted to see **Florida Congressman Byron Donalds** run for Governor of Florida after Ron DeSantis' tour of duty finished, Donalds appeared on Sean Hannity's Fox News show to announce his candidacy. "I think now is the time to take the mantle and lead our state into the future," he said.

Former **Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody**, who was appointed by DeSantis as U.S. Senator to replace **Marco Rubio**, who was elevated to the position of U.S. Secretary of State – has filed as a candidate to seek another Senate term.

Io fill Moody's old slot of Attorney General, DeSantis picked **James Uthmeier**, his former Chief-of-Staff and Campaign Manager. Referring to Uthmeier as his "bulldog" who gets things done, the Governor said he has been instrumental in virtually all of Florida's achievements over the past six years – from fighting COVID authoritarians to defeating woke ideology to enacting strong policies against illegal immigration. As a shining example of the Left's worst nightmare, Uthmeier said, "We will champion an America-first agenda, and we will fight back against the cartels, the gangs, and the traffickers that have wreaked havoc on our country for far too long. We will fight the activists that try to weaken our duly enacted laws, that try to challenge our constitutional order, and that try to harm the unborn.

- --Army 1st Lieutenant-turned-businessman **Daniel Driscoll** as Army Secretary, by a 66-28 vote on February 25.
- --Former Small Business Administration leader and World Wrestling Entertainment head Linda McMahon, as Education Secretary, by a 51-45 vote on March 3.
- --Former **Oregon Congresswoman Lori Chavez-DeRemer**, as Labor Secretary by a 67-32 vote on March 10.
- --Businessman **Stephen Feinberg, as** Deputy Secretary of Defense, by a 59-40 vote on March 14.



SOUNDS FROM THE TRUMP-ET

--President Donald Trump signed an executive order on March 25 requiring people to provide proof of American citizenship when they register to vote

and demanding that all ballots be reviewed by Election Day.

The order requires government-issued proof of U.S. citizenship on its voter registration forms, and directs the Attorney General to enter into information-sharing agreements with state election officials to identify cases of election fraud or other election law violations.

"There are other steps that we will be taking in the coming weeks," Trump said. "We think we'll be able to end up getting fair elections." Noting that he personally signs all executive orders, he said, "It's a great honor to sign this one."

--When the President delivered the first joint congressional speech of his second term on March 4, he chose that date for a specific reason. For more than a century, this was the original date that presidents were sworn into office, until the 20th Amendment to the Constitution moved it in 1933 to January 20.

Some people might call that a "coincidence," but Trump seems to find a way to work "a sense of history" in his favor.

During his address to the joint session of Congress, Trump highlighted instances of government waste and misuse of funds, including "spending \$8 million on making mice transgender." That caused CNN to charge the President with a "falsehood." But forcing CNN to retract its comment and spotlighting again how mainstream media can mislead the public, the White House then presented evidence confirming that \$8.3 million had indeed been allocated for "studies that involve mice receiving treatments that can be used in gender-affirming healthcare."

--President Trump signed an executive order on February 28 making English the official language of the United States for the first time in American history and rescinding a 2000 mandate issued by former President Bill Clinton requiring federal agencies and recipients of federal funding to provide language assistance to non-English speakers.

Trump's order reportedly is intended to celebrate multilingual Americans who have learned English and passed it down to their family members, while also empowering immigrants' to reach the American dream via a common language.

While the United States is home to an estimated 350-430 different languages, the new order does not eliminate multilingual services entirely, since federal agencies will still be able to assess whether to offer their services in languages other than English, based on their specific missions.

--Following an investigation into allegations that Columbia University did not adequately address recent incidents of discrimination and harassment against Jewish students on campus, Trump slashed \$400 million in federal grants from the school over its antisemitism failure.

--Now with the passing of Pete Rose – the most prolific hitter in baseball history, who was given a lifetime ban for betting on games – Trump believes it is time for him to be added to the Baseball Hall of Fame.

Noting that baseball is a game of redemption and second chances, and that Rose's gambling involved betting on his team and not against it, the President had this to say: "Major League Baseball didn't have the courage or decency to put the late, great, Pete Rose, also known as 'Charlie Hustle,' into the Baseball Hall of Fame. Now he is dead, will never experience the thrill of being selected, even though he was a FAR BETTER PLAYER than most of those who made it."

--The president announced that during February – his first full month in office – illegal border crossings were the lowest ever recorded, down 94 percent from last February, and 96 percent from the all-time high of the Biden administration.

--Beginning the process of his pledge to shut down the Department of Education, Trump on March 20 signed an executive order reducing its size and scope. "We're going to be returning education, very simply, back to the states where it belongs," he said. "This is a very popular thing to do, but much more importantly, it's a common sense thing to do, and it's going to work. Absolutely, it's going to work."

--Awarding Boeing a multi-billion-dollar contract to build the U.S. Air Force's most advanced fighter jet, Trump described it as "the most lethal aircraft ever built," and "a version of it has been secretly flying for the last five years." The high-speed stealth aircraft – designed to fly alongside unmanned drones in combat – has been dubbed "the F-47." Wonder why that number was chosen!

Some Observations

Recently I have spoken to members of the Democrat Party. Of course, I heard the same trite arguments that come right out of

the Democrat National Committee. Notice that it is not the Democratic Committee because there's nothing Democratic about the Democrat Committee. Ask Bernie Sanders about the 2016 Primary.

One of the first things that was said was about Elon Musk calling the Social Security Administration a "Ponzi Scheme".

In 1935, in the midst of the Great Depression, saw a need for a "safety net" for the elderly, the unemployed and the disadvantaged. The Social Security Act was signed into law as part of the New Deal.

It didn't take long for politicians to see the Social Security Fund as a means to fund projects they may not be able to get financing through Congress. Lyndon Johnson was the first President to break open the Social Security Piggy





Bank. Every President since then saw the Fund as their personnel slush fund. Although the funds must be replaced with interest, it is often put on the back burner in the National Budget.

When questioned we are told it is not a "raid" of the Social Security funds, but rather a way for the government to manage its finances, using the surpluses to avoid borrowing from the public debt markets. We're told the government simply lends

it's surplus to the Treasury and it uses these "resources" to finance other government activity and avoiding going into public debt markets to borrow.

Sounds like a raid to me. So, when they say, "Social Security Administration will run out of money in the near future" I would like to know where all the surplus went, after all, it's our money.

So yes, it's a sort of Ponzi Scheme. -0-

Then the Department of Education was the next topic. "Why is this administration taking funding away from our children?" needs are different than Florida's. Every state has their own unique needs. Curriculums should be administered by state and local school boards. Government closest to the people is the most powerful government. You know your school board members. They are your neighbors and friends. It is easier to deal with the state and local boards that trying to buck the bureaucracy that is the Department of Education.

There is NO money being taken away from educating our children. Rather, it will be going from the Treasury to the States which will better control education in various areas of the nation. We cannot use a cookie cutter approach. New York's needs are different than Florida's and every state has their own unique circumstances that need to be addressed on a state by state basis.

President Jimmy Carter established the Department of Education in 1979, keeping a campaign promise to the nation's largest teachers' union, the National Education Association. It was a bribe made offered to the Teachers unions. He did so over the objections of his own presidential transition team and many in Congress — including fellow Democrats.

After 40 years there has been a dramatic drop in the level of education our children have been receiving. With the assistance of and at times the direction of the Teachers Unions, school administrators have been bogged down with paperwork and often forced to change their curriculum to fit the comply with experimental programs which were mandated by the Department of Education. Billions have been funneled into the Department. The gap between school districts in middle to upper class neighborhoods and low income neighborhoods has not narrowed. The federal taxpayers spent around \$200 billion in additional education funding during COVID-19, yet mathematics and reading scores in public schools have declined. One reason is that Randi Weingarten, the president of the largest teachers union made one excuse after another to keep school closed. But at least we have the term "What's your pronoun" thanks to the Department of Education and the teachers unions.

Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), a group of mostly highly developed, democratic nations ranks the United States as 28th among OECD members in math. The U.S ranked 37th out of 37 in science according to Pew Research.

Harriet Hageman (R-Wyoming) reports that the federal Education Department has a "budget of about \$280 billion a

year. Less than 25% goes to educating our students."

"The federal Department of Education spends — has a budget of about \$280 billion a year. Less than 25% goes to educating our students," she said. "So where does the other \$220 billion go? It goes to a bureaucracy, it goes to a consultant, and that consultant then donates money back to the Democrats, and then it goes to a different consultant, and then it goes to" a nongovernmental organization." "Public education spending in the United States falls short of global benchmarks and lags behind economic growth; K-12 schools spend \$857.2 billion total (\$17,277 per pupil) annually" according to the Education data Initiative.

We spend more per student than any other industrialized nation, yet we lag behind in math, science and reading.

So, where does the money go. I guess the unions are doing pretty well with our money.

If Joy Reid is a sample of public education, we are in trouble. In case you haven't heard, according to Joy we fought the Canadians during the War of 1812, the Canadians burned down

the White House and we lost the war.

HIGHLIGHTING CAPITOL HILL

DOGE is the wake-up call that Washington needs. Every dollar the federal government squanders is a dollar taken from hardworking Americans, and that is why I'm all in for Elon Musk's Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) – and why I'm stunned at the resistance it's facing from Democrats and the entrenched bureaucracy.

If there's one thing we should all agree on, it's that your tax dollars shouldn't be thrown away on frivolous nonsense. DOGE is here to fix that, and Congress needs to get on board.

It's no secret that the federal government is a mess. I've been hammering this point since my days in the Florida Legislature, where we fought to keep spending in check. Now, in Washington, I see the same disconnect at a scale many times larger than I saw at the state level. Take USAID – supposedly helping people around the world who are in crisis, yet somehow finding \$1.5 million for LGBTQ programs in Serbia, \$25,000 for a Peruvian opera, and \$13 million for a "Sesame Street" clone in Iraq.

I'm not against aid where it's needed, but this? This is a slap in the face to every American scraping by, paying 20-30% more for gas and groceries while Washington plays global philanthropist with their money.

As you might expect, Democrats are howling at these efforts. They're mad because they lost the majority and can't keep the gravy train rolling. But here's the truth: People are hurting. They work hard, pay their taxes, and expect a government that doesn't treat their dollars like Monopoly money.

Let me be clear: Cutting waste doesn't mean slashing what matters. Social Security and Medicare are earned commitments, not bargaining chips. You paid into them for the last generation, you've earned the same benefits. DOGE isn't coming for them; it's protecting them. By rooting out billions in fraud and trimming fat from bloated agencies, we're ensuring these programs stay solvent for the people who've paid into them.

I've fought for Florida's retirees my whole career, and I'm not going to let bureaucratic excess jeopardize their security. Florida has long lead the way on this issue. When I was President of the Florida Senate, we launched a website that tracked every budget allocation and shows exactly where it was spent. We put spending in the sunshine because taxpayers deserve to know how their dollars are being spent. That website is still running today at www.transparencyflorida.gov. Florida is proving we can do better, and I'm working right now to bring that sort of transparency to the federal government (stay tuned!).

Congress has to step up. We're not here to coddle the swamp — we're here to drain it. Democrats call it a "reign of terror." I call it accountability that's long overdue. If transparency scares them, maybe they're the ones who need to explain themselves.

This isn't about ideology; it's about stewardship. Whether you're a Republican, Democrat, or independent, you should want a government that works for you, not against you. DOGE is a chance to right-size this beast and give Americans the efficient, transparent leadership they deserve.

The Florida Legislature convened at the Florida Capitol for Opening Day of the 2025 127th Regular Legislative Session on Tuesday, March 4th at 10:00 a.m. **Governor Ron**

DeSantis delivered his annual "State of the State" address during the Joint Legislative Session.

During the 2025 session we will be addressing key issues including (but not limited to):

- Illegal Immigration
- Economy and Infrastructure
- Government Efficiency
- Affordable Housing
- Homeowners, property, and health care insurance
- Hurricane/storm preparation and recovery
- Workforce shortages, K-12 schools, and school choice
- Environmental and economic development

Governor DeSantis, highlighting the many accomplishments of the Florida State Guard (FSG) since re-establishment in 2022, said it was established "to act as a force multiplier for state, local, and federal public safety and emergency response efforts."

Some of the FSG highlights include: an astounding 425% growth in personnel; establishment of three new operational units; initiation of five construction projects to support statewide posture requirements; and its forces have been deployed ten times throughout Florida, Texas, and North Carolina in support of emergency management and public safety operations.

Governor DeSantis announced the early completion of the NASA Causeway Bridge in Brevard County, one of two recently completed bridges, six months ahead of schedule. The new bridge officially opened to traffic on March 19, According to the Governor's office, "The new, taller, and wider bridges stretch 4,025 feet over the Indian River and, as fixed spans, they eliminate the need for drawbridge openings."

Florida U.S. Senator Ashley Moody introduced the Homes for Every Local Protector, Educator, and Responder (HELPER) Act which will create a first-time homebuyer home loan program for law enforcement, firefighters, EMTs, paramedics, and teachers. "In Florida, we're a law-and-order state," she said. "That will never be a question. We will always make sure that we don't just support them by our words, but by our actions and that they have the tools, the resources, the community, the state support that they need."

The bipartisan bill, HR 2094, with support from U.S. Representatives John Rutherford (R-FL), Bonnie Watson Colemen (D-NJ), Andrew Garbarino (R-NY), was recently reintroduced and Moody and Georgia Democrat Jon Osoff introduced companion legislation in the U.S. Senate.

Florida House Bill 175, referred to as the "Jason Raynor Act," passed the Judiciary Committee with strong support. The bill aims to ensure the toughest penalties on perpetrators who

commit crimes against police officers and other law enforcement personnel.

On June 23, 2021, Officer Jason Raynor of Daytona Beach was attacked and shot while in the line of duty. He tragically died 55 days later. The criminal was charged with 1st degree murder but was found guilty of the lesser charge of manslaughter due to a legal technicality.

House Bill 6017, to recover damages for medical negligence resulting in death, passed the Judiciary Committee with overwhelming support.

The Brevard County Sheriff's Office recently announced plans to build a \$20 million regional law enforcement training complex in Viera. The new 45,000 square foot facility will be located off Judge Fran Jamieson Way between the Government Center and the Florida Department of Health building. Construction will begin in January 2026 with anticipated completion by May 2027.

The training center will provide specialized instruction in crisis management, de-escalation tactics, and human trafficking awareness.

The law enforcement training complex will also serve multiple counties including Indian River, Lake, Orange, Osceola, Seminole, and Volusia, in addition to Brevard County. According to the Sheriff's office, the center will also serve to strengthen partnerships between local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies for the improvement of regional emergency response capabilities.

In addition to law enforcement training, the facility will be equipped to hold community engagement events such as citizen workshops and educational programs for students.

The Brevard County Sheriff's Department officials have submitted a \$10 million request to the Florida Legislature to help fund the training center.

In October 2023, boaters in the Sebastian Inlet reported a struggling sea turtle entangled in a crab pot line. The veterinary team at the Brevard Zoo Sea Turtle Healing Center was alerted and they performed a six-hour surgery to amputate "Mischief's" right flipper due to the prolonged lack of circulation.

Over the next 16 months, Mischief underwent multiple procedures to clean the wound and remove dead tissue before being cleared for release on February 18 at Paradise Beach Park.

According to Brevard Zoo officials, Mischief has adapted to life with three flippers, and they expect he will thrive in the wild given his lengthy recovery time.

Florida Attorney General James Uthmeier announced a \$79 million settlement with vape company JUUL Labs, Inc. to resolve litigation over the company's marketing targeted toward Florida children. JUUL is now prohibited from the advertising, promotion, or marketing of products to Florida's youth.

"As a father, the safety and wellbeing of children is top of mind, all the time. Florida has been a leader in the fight to end teen vaping, and I'm proud to announce this monumental settlement with JUUL," Uthmeier said.

House Bill 949 passed the House Education Administration Subcommittee with unanimous support.

The bill prohibits students from using wireless communication devices during school days rather than just during instructional time. It also requires schools to designate locations within the school building where students can use their cell phones with the permission of a school administrator. It also provides school districts with the flexibility to implement the best fit policies for their school district including whether students can have cell phones with them in their school bags.

House Bill 907 codifying the Florida Institute for Pediatric Disease as a statewide resource passed the House Education Administration Subcommittee with unanimous support. The Institute's goal is to conduct research, develop diagnostic and genetic screening tools, provide multidisciplinary clinical services and care, educate and train healthcare professionals, and collaborate with other institutions and organizations

Two other candidates, Debbie Mayfield (who was in session in Tallahassee) and Tim Thomas were not in attendance at the Forum.

Adkins and Lightner III sparred for nearly 45 minutes. The topics covered ranged from property taxes to term limits to the Live Local Act. Adkins disagreed with the ruling of the Florida Supreme Court to allow State Representative, Debbie Mayfield a term limits exemption to run for office. Lightner III, insisted that the court had no choice, considering a loophole in the law.

Adkins was open to maintaining the property tax system, while Lightner III leaned toward looking into a new means of taxation apart from property taxes. Both candidates disagreed with the live local law that provides exemptions to developers for the building of affordable housing. Each decried the assault upon the authority of local governments to properly serve its citizens.

Members of the Brevard County Republican Assembly voted following the Forum to endorse Lightner III by an overwhelming margin. You can view excerpts of the Forum on the Brevard News Facebook page.

There was an announcement following the Forum about the Small Business Workshop to be sponsored by the Assembly on March 29. Speakers scheduled for the event included: **Jessie Wright**, Searstown Mall Developer; **Christopher Childs**, vice-chairman of Titusville Planning & Zoning; **Matt Agnini**, president of the Brevard Business Alliance and **District 1 County Commissioner Katie Delaney.**

The goal of the workshop is to provide guidance for navigating ordinance issues; licensing and other regulatory issues that hinder small businesses. The workshop will also offer collaboration opportunities for small businesses. It is hoped that such collaboration would lead to the formulation of an agenda to aid municipalities in curbing regulations.

In participating in the April 1 primary election, Thomas said his State Senate goals are to fight for policies that protect job economy from artificial intelligence; for solutions to protect residents from rising insurance costs; for competitive pay for first responders and firefighters; to advance infrastructure, roadways, and housing economy; for state funding to increase protection agencies and advance local police forces; and to fund local veteran organizations to advance healthcare, mental health, and support services. As a military man, Thomas said, he supports the Second Amendment and agrees there should be open carry allowed in Florida. "I am also a First Amendment guy," he added, showing support for freedom of speech, religion, the press, the right of assembly, and the right to petition the



government....A second speaker on the HIRC program, **Brevard County School Board District 2 Member Gene Trent**, said the five district representatives comprising the current board are "like-minded members" who brought the county schools to an A rating – advancing excellence in education. He is now serving the third year of his current term, after

being elected to "change the system," While the previous board included a Democrat and an Independent, the current five members are all Republican. There are 21 schools in Trent's District 2, and he said this school year there has been a 97 percent retention rate for teachers. Two things that are of concern to the Board as a whole, he said, are the retention of teachers and school bus drivers. Trent said the academic achievements by Brevard County schools last year included an "A" rating for the first time in five years, and the graduation rate increased from 87.2 percent to 89.8 percent. To enhance workforce readiness, he said, 17 new Career & Technical Education programs were established. Safety remains a top priority in the schools, and weapons detection systems have been installed in all of the high schools. Trent added that at the start of the current school year, every bus route was staffed with a driver, and every day, more than 15,000 students in Brevard County are transported to school daily.

It was surely no accident that the narrow and previously fractious Republican majority in the House elected a speaker and passed a budget resolution with just one dissenting vote. Similarly, Trump's toplevel appointees have all been confirmed by the Senate. ...Fourth, there was no return to norms of civil discourse. Trump called former President Joe Biden 'the worst president in American history' and condemned 'the open-border, insane policies that (Biden had) allowed to destroy the country.' Democrats have a point when they say Trump started this with his derogatory nicknames for 2016 opponents. Republicans

have a point when they say Democrats escalated this with the Russia collusion hoax and baseless post-presidential prosecutions.... Fifth, Trump continues to disregard free-market economists' (in my opinion, wise) advice. He must know that's likely to reduce his clout with foreign leaders and American politicians.... Like him or not, he is a formidable man."





'Today, the Court makes a most unfortunate misstep that rewards an act of judicial hubris and imposes a \$2 billion penalty on American taxpayers. The District Court has made plain its frustration with the Government, and respondents raise serious concerns about nonpayment for completed work. But the relief ordered is, quite simply, too extreme a response. A federal court has many tools to address a party's supposed nonfeasance'....Supreme Court watchers have become used to Roberts being the swing justice on the court, but the hope was that Barrett and the other four conservative justices would make his intermittent inclination to flip irrelevant. Barrett's increasing proclivity to join him in taking the liberal position is disappointing, particularly since Trump appointed her."





Republican Representative Brian Mast of Florida, Chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, has instructed staff to use the term 'Judea and Samaria' instead of 'West Bank' Republican Senator Tom Cotton of Arkansas said 'The Jewish people's legal and historic rights to Judea and Samaria go back thousands of years. The U.S. should stop using the politically charged term West Bank to refer to the biblical heartland of Israel.' Senator Cotton has introduced legislation recognizing Judea and Samaria, but it is unlikely to pass in the Senate with Democrat opposition and the 60-vote threshold requirement. Ambassador to Israel-designate Mike Huckabee has said 'There is no such thing as a West Bank. It is Judea and Samaria and is legally part of Israel.' The term 'West Bank' is an invention of the Kingdom of Jordan that describes lands west of the Jordan River which the Kingdom occupied from 1947 until 1966. The Turkish Ottoman Empire ruled the area from 1517 until 1917, when the victorious Allies of World War I allocated the territory to the British Mandate of Palestine. In 1947, Israel was established. Neighboring Arab states immediately attacked Israel with the intent to eliminate the Jewish state. Israel survived the onslaught but over 600,000 Palestinian Arabs fled primarily to Jordan, Egypt, and Syria. One million Jews fled Arab countries and settled in Israel. Jordan invaded Judea and Samaria and called them the West Bank. In the 1966 war, Israel seized the lands from Jordan and has controlled them since.... The usual definition of 'bank' along a river is a narrow strip of land; not an area of approximately 2,000 square miles. 'West Bank' is, however, a useful term to delegitimize Jewish historical connection to the land. Judea and Samaria are names of territories that go back to biblical times. Judea and Samaria are names of ancient Israelite kingdoms with Jerusalem in the center; Judea in the south and

Samaria in the north. After two unsuccessful Israeli revolts against the Roman Empire, Emperor Hadrian (117-138 CE) named the provinces Syria Palaestina to root out Jewish nationalism. The U.N. and International Court of Justice view Israeli control of Judea and Samaria as illegal and an 'occupation' and the land as Palestinian territory.... Approximately 4 million Palestinian Arabs live in Judea and Samaria, including East Jerusalem.... The two-state concept of Israel and Palestine is dormant. Palestinians want to eliminate Israel and kill Jews. There will be no Palestinian state as long as Israel has the power to prevent it. The two million Palestinian Arabs living in Gaza on October 7, 2023, proved beyond reasonable doubt that peace will not happen as long as Islamic ideology controls the Palestinian culture in Gaza and Judea and Samaria. The Wisconsin-based atheists accused the teacher of turning her classroom into a Sunday school....The school district said in a letter to the atheists that they had met with the teacher and the situation had been resolved....We assume that means the teacher will no longer be allowed to tell the children that they were made in God's image or that life is precious. Or that Jesus is the reason for the season."
